Reading Every Day

Reading practise is the single most beneficial activity that you can support with at home. The progress made across the entire curriculum for a child that has daily reading practise is markedly different to that of a child who does not read daily with an adult. Whilst we would sincerely love to be able to read one-to-one with every child it simply isn't possible, and so there is an expectation that all school aged children will read daily at home.

If you are struggling with this, or feel that you need some advice or strategies to help you, please let your child's teacher know so that we can arrange some time to support you.

Reading bed time stories together, talking about the text, the characters and what is happening in the story builds the foundations for a love of books and the motivation to learn to read independently when the time comes.

Clubs

If your child attends any paid clubs within school please can you ensure that it is a written in the front of the going home books so that teacher are aware who is attending which club.

Weather...

As the weather is improving, please make sure that children come to school with a sun hat and their water bottle. You will need to apply sun cream before school to protect your children, as staff are unable to apply it during the day. Children still need to come to school with a coat in case it rains.

Measles, Mumps and Rubella

Parents urged to check children's measles, mumps, rubella (MMR) vaccine records following rise in measles cases
The UK Health Security Agency have issued a press release urging parents to check children's MMR vaccine records following a rise in measles cases. Most of the cases have been in London, although there have been cases detected across the country and some are linked to travel abroad.

NSPCC's Underwear Rule

Ongoing as part of our PHSE curriculum all children discuss the **NSPCC's Underwear Rule** in the classes at school.

During these discussions we aim to teach our pupils the following important safety skills without giving explicit information or telling scary stories. We teach our pupils the NSPCC's Underwear Rule, using the 'PANTS' acrostic, which is like a green cross code for staying safe from sexual abuse.

PANTS stands for:

- Privates are private
- Always remember your body belongs to you
- No means no
- Talk about secrets that upset you
- Speak up, someone can help

Lessons introduce a range of ideas, all delivered in a way that is fully ageappropriate. These include:-

- "Appropriate" and "inappropriate" touching
- Your child's right to say no to things that make them feel upset or uncomfortable
- Naming parts of the body
- Who your child can turn to if they ever feel upset or worried.
