Feeling Good Week

The children have had a range of learning and activities that encouraged them to reflect, work together, strengthen relationships, and develop greater empathy and understanding to positively share how they feel which can help encourage positive mental health.

Safeguarding

At Moss Lane School we ensure that our children are **safe and happy and aiming high**. Included in that is our strong ethos of Safeguarding, making sure our children are safe physically and mentally. We are reaching out to our wider Moss Lane Family in the hopes that you will be able to help us with a few areas where we can help keep our children physically safe.

- 1) If the back door is shut under NO circumstances should it be opened.
- 2) Please ensure that the small red pedestrian gate is shut and bolted when entering or exiting the site outside of normal drop off and collection times.
- 3) Do not let anyone follow you through the gate outside of drop off and collection times. We know that it can be awkward to ask someone to press the buzzer but it is important.
- 4) Do not be offended if someone asks you to shut and bolt the side gate and / or someone asks you to press the buzzer.
- 5) Please do not park in front of the red gates, even if you are running late or dropping off / collecting outside of the normal times. Access through the gates is needed at all times.
- 6) Please pass these important messages onto anyone who is dropping off or collecting your child.
- 7) Please can I remind that no dogs are allowed on to school grounds even if carried in arms.



Reading Corner

Miss Betterton's Book Recommendation:

The Oak Tree written by Julia Donaldson & illustrated by Victo-



This engaging and informative story is written in Julia Donaldson's trademark rhyme. This is the story of an oak tree, which lives through many changes. The rhyming text pulls you through the life of the tree, which is always shown with children playing around it. The illustrations are warm and beautiful and reflect the diversity of human and animal life in and around the tree.

Interesting news:

Research from the BookTrust finds that the more people in a child's life who are involved in influencing their reading, the more likely the child is to become a keen independent reader.

'Reading influencers' include different family members such as parents, siblings, grandparents, as well as teachers or other trusted people in their lives. These experiences have a marked impact on a child's love of reading.

Reading practice at home becoming a chore?

- Try changing location or the time of day
- Take turns—adult reads a page, child reads a page etc.
- Involve someone new, read to a new audience

MYSTERY READERS WANTED!



WHO?

All parents/carers, grandparents, older siblings, relatives or, other special people!

Surprise your child by being a 'Mystery Reader' in their classroom this academic year.

WHY?

Children LOVE having their family and friends visit their classroom, getting involved in their learning. So being read too by a 'Mystery Reader' would be an exciting learning experience for everyone.

WHAT?

Mystery Readers are invited to share a story book from home, or borrow one from the class teacher/library and read it to the class. Mystery Readers could also dress up as a character from their chosen book, bring a prop to use or share a piece of music linked to the story. These extra parts are not compulsory!

HOW?

Potential 'Mystery Readers' should (discreetly) communicate directly with the class teacher to arrange a date to join the class for up to 15 minutes during a school day. Please have a selection of dates available to offer the class teacher. To retain the surprise element of the Mystery Reader, it is important that the children are not informed of any Mystery Readers real identities until they appear in the class room!
