

# GODALMING LEARNING PARTNERSHIP 2020-2021 News SPRING Term

Our spring newsletter comes to you as we are delighted to have finally welcomed all children back in school. The last year has provided a very steep learning curve for the education world; not least for parents and the role you have had to play in supporting your child's learning. All of our communities should be extremely proud of what has been achieved and I know schools have learnt a great deal.

The close working relationships developing across the GLP have provided invaluable support to staff – not least Headteachers – under serious stress and pressure during the pandemic. The year has highlighted benefits and challenges of providing similar approaches across our variety of schools. We aim to achieve greater alignment between our schools' responses, as you will see below, but must always be mindful of each individual school's needs, premises and staffing capacity.

## Comeback programme

We are working on our schools' *Comeback* programme. This will include how we collectively resolve any academic gaps the children may have experienced, but also tackle the social and emotional deficits, which are arguably more pressing. Children will be consulted and each school will feed back to parents once Headteachers and the GLP Board have met.





# **Inter-school Competitions**

We continue to develop challenges for our GLP children and, whilst our mixed sports competitions have taken a COVID hit, we have inspired children to write and create art instead. ## Achievements 2019-2021

There is no doubt that pandemic restrictions made achieving some of our plans impossible this past year. Nevertheless, we have continued:

- Talk for Writing training via MS Teams; teachers report the new approach working surprisingly well remotely as well as face to face.
- developing a formal system of school support using external consultant *Healthchecks* to identify each school's strengths and areas for development. This will lead into an agreed plan of support provided by staff in other GLP schools or external specialists as required.
- our *GET Teaching* training programme, modified for remote learning and extended to ensure trainees get their full range of experiences with children in school.
- ensuring the Trust runs efficiently and is financially secure.



### Cooperative Schools Network:

This last year has shown what assets schools are, in enabling home learning and in-class learning (often at the same time), providing equipment for children at home, sorting out broadband supply, managing food provision, COVID testing, financial support.
