Summary of pupil premium funding 2015-16

Objectives of spending Pupil Premium are

- To ensure all disadvantaged groups of children make expected or better than expected progress.
- To provide a home school link worker
- To provide targeted support to individual children to ensure they can access their learning.
- To provide targeted support in Maths and Literacy and to secure improvement in achievement for disadvantaged children in these areas.
- To ensure that all disadvantaged children are given opportunities to be involved in all enrichment activities (e.g. swimming, school trips, and breakfast club).

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| Additional reading interventions | Targeted support for children not making expected progress in reading from class LSA | £1,000 | Reading progress has been excellent with 100% of the targeted children making 4 steps and more progress. |
| Early literacy support (5 minute phonics) | Reading and writing intervention for children who are not making expected progress in their learning (phonics based) | £700 | Interventions meant that 100% children in receipt of pupil premium were able to make 4 steps progress and more. |
| Early numeracy support (5 minute maths) | Maths intervention for children who are not making expected progress in their learning. | £700 | Interventions meant that 100% children in receipt of pupil premium made 6 steps progress |
| Social skills group | This allows children to practice social skills such as turn taking, sharing and developing emotional literacy | £600 | Behavior and inclusion of children in all activities of the school has been good as these invaluable skills have been specifically taught to children who need them. Incidents in the playground are at an extremely low level. |
| Trip subsidy | Children able to learn, opportunities for new learning experiences provided | £450 | Pupil premium children were at no visible disadvantage to other children in the school and were able to attend all learning activities and trips provided. |
| Club subsidy | Children able to learn, opportunities for new learning experiences provided | £450 | Self- esteem through sport and the social skills gained through interaction with other children at after school clubs means that Pupil Premium children we |
