
Reception Production

CONCERNS OVER VIDEO GAMES

When parents want to buy appropriate video games for their children, it can be a frustrating experience. There are many games out there that may look like they are aimed at young kids, but they are really better for older children or teenagers. Parents can take a few steps to ensure that they are buying the right games for their system, games that their children can play easily and understand, and games which are not too violent or inappropriate for younger children.

Video games are a booming business especially at Christmas time, and almost every family has at least one gaming console, if not more, as well as handheld consoles for keeping children entertained while travelling. Children of all ages love engaging in games, and some games can keep kids entertained while teaching them too. Video games can help improve children's hand-eye coordination and teach them a bit about healthy competition too.

Some parents have expressed a concern that their children are playing unsuitable video games when visiting friends' houses, and we would ask that parents restrict access to violent games and films. If video games has an rating 15+ or 18+ sign it is not about the difficulty of the game but that it is not suitable for any persons under the age of 15+ or 18+. Research shows that such games can have detrimental effects on developing minds and do not help children learn the values we are trying to instil. So please check when buying games for Christmas for your child that they are suitable. Thank you for your support regarding this matter.

Online Safety



Each half term the children are learning about online safety and the importance of staying safe online. Do talk to your children about what they have been learning in class. It is also worth reviewing your parental controls on your electronic devices to ensure your child can only access age appropriate content.

Lateness and Absence


Morning Procedures: Classrooms doors open at 8:50am for dropping off the children, and children must be in their classrooms and ready for lessons to start at 9am. All parents should have left school premises by 9am please, or have signed in at the school office if they are staying for any reason. If you arrive at school at 9am or later, you must bring your child to the school office so that they can be marked into the register by the office. All lateness is recorded and monitored by the Educational Welfare Officer. If you know you are going to be late for school, it is helpful if you ring school at the earliest opportunity to let them know the situation. If your child is absent from school for any reason, please telephone the school office before 9:30am. We also ask that you provide a letter to their teacher explain their absence on their return to school. (Please always phone the office with any time critical messages such as absence or collection arrangements as we cannot guarantee to read emails at the necessary time.)

Why it is important to be in school on time— Punctuality is linked with good attendance and forms good habits for your child's future. If your child misses the start of the school day, they will miss work and vital time with the class teacher. Important information about the day ahead is often shared with the class in the mornings. Your child may also miss the opportunity to socialise with their friends before settling down to a day of learning. Children arriving late into school often disrupt lessons, which can be embarrassing and upsetting for the child.

Top Tips for parents

- Pack school bags the night before
- Ensure your child has a good bedtime routine so they get plenty of rest and don't struggle to get out of bed in the mornings
- Make time for breakfast before leaving for school
- Aim to get to school 10 minutes before the bell goes
- Invest in a reliable alarm clock

Measles Outbreak Information

There is a measles outbreak in Surrey affecting unimmunised children and adults. Measles is highly infectious. It can cause serious illness and can sometimes be fatal. Vaccination with 2 doses of MMR is the only way to protect children and young people. There are also measles outbreaks occurring in Europe, particularly in Romania, Italy and Germany, and if you are planning to travel overseas please ensure that your child is up to date with their routine immunisations, including MMR.

The first MMR vaccine is given to toddlers at the age of 13 months and the second injection at around 3 years and 4 months before your child goes to school. MMR can be given to older children, teenagers and young adults if they missed their injections when they were younger. Contact your GP practice if your child needs an MMR vaccine. The vaccine is free. If you are not sure if your child needs an MMR vaccine, you can contact the GP to ask.

Measles is not just a little kids' problem. Teenagers, young adults and anyone who has missed their MMR vaccination can get measles. The first signs of measles are fever, cough, runny nose and red sore eyes. After a few days, a spotty rash will appear. It starts on the face and neck before spreading to the rest of the body.

If you think your child has measles, ring your GP practice for advice. Don't turn up to the surgery, walk in centre or to accident and emergency without calling ahead. The doctor will make special arrangements to see your child so that if your child has measles – they won't pass it on to others. Keep people with symptoms of measles away from others to avoid spreading measles, and stay away from school, nursery or work for 5 days after the onset of rash.

Safeguarding

We are aware of Surrey children accessing an explicit video involving a child which has been distributed via social media. This is currently under investigation by Hampshire Constabulary.

If you have received this explicit video on Snapchat, Instagram or by any other means you must delete it immediately. If you show this video to someone else or forward it on to other people you could be committing a criminal offence, which the police may investigate and consider prosecution.

The people in the video have been identified and specialist police officers are supporting them to ensure their safety.

If you have any knowledge or relevant information related to who shared this video or how it was distributed, please contact Hampshire Constabulary on 101 as soon as possible.

Nut free zone

Please can we remind parents the school is a nut free zone, and packed lunches should not include any nut produces, for example peanut butter and Nutella.



Emergency School Closures

Our expectation is that the school will, as far as possible, always remain open. In bad weather, it is only when staff are unable to get to work and the safety of the children is thus compromised, or if we have a heating failure or serious loss of power that the school might consider closure. Please remember to tell us if you have changed your phone number and/or e-mail address. If the school is to be closed, we will endeavour to send a text message and/or email out to you as early as possible - power and network permitting. We will also endeavour to post a message on the school website and you can also check the Surrey County Council website for school closures.
